

Literature

1. A good public library or Christian college/university library should host most if not all books listed in the module descriptors.
2. For classic publications and older books, try the Internet Archive (<https://archive.org/about/>), where you can download or borrow books for free after signing up.
3. The free Open Access Digital Theological Library currently provides access to over 190,000 eBooks and thousands of journals (<http://oadtl.org>).
4. You can also try Google Books to search for terms or books (which usually displays a few pages).
5. For a lot of the Core Reading literature students can purchase e-books.
6. If you prefer to purchase a printed version, used books are often a good solution.
7. You should be able to locate literature on one of the following websites:

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8. Prices in the module descriptors only serve as a best effort estimate based on amazon.com prices at the beginning of 2020. They should help students calculate approximate funds for purchasing literature. Actual seller prices may vary. It is the students' responsibility to acquire books at a price and condition that suits them best.
